UPDATE FROM YOUTH IMPACT

Shalom Center and Impact Library

From Hiwotu Kassaw, Youth Impact Director:

Covid-19 is not affecting Youth Impact to a significant degree at this time. Since our last report, we have allowed more

children to come to the centers for services. Schools are not opened yet, so children are spending more time with us. Schools are set to reopen soon at which time we will return to a more normal routine.

The children receive services in the center based on the schedule. They play and use the library, creativity room, and other facilities, while also meeting with their mentors for discussion and counseling. The families



of the children we serve are in desperate need of basic food supplies. Monthly, we give two food items (one liter of oil and five kg of flour) to our families.

Hope Center

The remaining eight boys in the Hope Center have graduated from the mentoring program. They have all gotten jobs and are living independently. These young men have been provided with



furniture and materials, such as bunk beds, mattresses, blankets and bedsheets, to help them establish their new living quarters. The arrival of the 14th batch of boys is scheduled to be finalized in the next two weeks.

Youth Impact Volunteer Club

A mentoring program for commercial sex workers has begun on a regular basis. We have now 10 women who are attending the program regularly.

Every Thursday morning, they come to the center for a day dedicated only to them. The plan is to change their lives permanently by mobilizing resources and creating opportunities from local sources.



OTHER ACTIVITIES

The Youth Impact staff took a recreational trip and conducted a program review meeting from October 22 – 27, 2020 in Gondar and Bahir Dar.

Program review was conducted for all the centers (mostly refining detailed activities and refining roles and responsibilities of our mentors). Job descriptions have been modified accordingly, and detailed activity plans have been prepared.
